If you would like to become a teacher in Connecticut, a variety of preparation options exist. You may start as a paraprofessional or a substitute, or seek admission to a **traditional certification program** offered by one of 16 Connecticut colleges:

You also can start at one of the several Connecticut community colleges which offer a **Pathway to Teaching Careers** associate's degree. This program parallels the first two years of study at the Connecticut State University for students who wish to transfer to a four-year degree program. Several **non-traditional programs** also operate in Connecticut and are listed on the following page. You can learn more about any of these programs by contacting the **Education & Employment Information Center**, a statewide clearinghouse operated by the Connecticut Department of Higher Education.

By far, the most **popular certification fields** are elementary and early childhood education, followed by history/social studies and English at the secondary and middle school level. **Teacher shortages**, however, exist in ten fields:

- Bilingual Education PreK-12
- Comprehensive Special Education PreK-12
- English 7-12
- Intermediate Administrator
- Library Media Specialist
- Mathematics 7-12
- Music, PreK-12
- Science 7-12
- Speech and Language Pathology
- World Languages 7-12

In addition to teachers in these fields, the State of Connecticut seeks more minority educators who currently comprise just seven percent of all Connecticut teachers. The State's **Minority Teacher Incentive Grant** and **Weisman Scholarship Programs** (www.ctdhe.org/SFA/pdfs/MTIPForm.pdf) offer financial aid and forgiveness loans to minority undergraduates studying to become teachers.

Non-Traditional Certification Pathways

- www.ctdhe.org/ARC/default.htm – The Alternate Route to Teacher Certification (ARC I & ARC II) is an accelerated, non-credit program conducted by the Connecticut Department of Higher Education to attract mid-career professionals into teaching. A minimum of a bachelor's degree and an academic major in the subject you wish to teach are among the application criteria.

This is in cooperation with Eastern Connecticut State University, Mitchell College, Fairfield University, Southern Connecticut State University, St. Joseph College, University of Connecticut, and University of Hartford. This certifies qualified applicants to work in settings such as public preschools, Birth to Three Early Intervention services, and public school kindergartens.

By interning in a school, class tuition is paid by host school, but registration and student teaching fees are required.
