## FALL 2006 COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY ENROLLMENT IN CONNECTICUT — COMPREHENSIVE REPORT —

Enrollment at Connecticut's 47 colleges and universities reached an all-time record of 176,560 in fall 2006 (see Tables 1 and 3 at the end of the text of this report.)<sup>1</sup> A November 2006 report, *Fall 2006 College and University Headcounts in Connecticut*<sup>2</sup>, analyzed headcount enrollment by status, level, institution and sector. This broader report presents general trends in headcount enrollment; analyzes data on full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment and provides demographic details on residence, race, freshmen, migration of recent high school graduates, gender and age.

This report introduces new demographic data on Connecticut's population as the benchmark for comparison to the demographics of our state's college students. Earlier reports used counts from the U.S. Census of the state's population as of April 1, 2000; this report uses the Census Bureau's population estimates as of July 1, 2005, as released in December 2006. These new estimates are especially striking on the subjects of race/ethnicity, gender and age.

### GENERAL TRENDS

The fall 2006 total of 176,560 students is the highest ever for Connecticut and represents a fifth consecutive year of record enrollment. It also is the ninth consecutive year of growth since 1997 when total enrollment (154,059) was the lowest of the last quarter century.

This year's increase of 2,287 students (1.3%) over 2005, however, is the fourth consecutive year of tepid growth. The average annual growth rate of 1.0 percent in the four years since 2002 is overshadowed by the 2.4 percent average annual growth between 1998 and 2002.

The overall growth rate of 1.3 percent in 2006 reflects increases of 1.9 percent in full-time enrollment and 0.2 percent in part-time enrollment. In 1992, full-time students at all levels were a slight majority (50.7%) of total enrollment, but by 2006 reached a solid 65 percent.

Even more remarkable is the growth in traditional students (defined here as full-time undergraduates under age 25) between 1993 and 2006, as shown in the exhibit. Total enrollment saw a modest nine percent gain over the 13 years, but the 45 percent growth among traditional students and 14 percent drop for all other students has significantly changed the demography of Connecticut higher education.

Traditional students were not much more than a third of total enrollment in 1993 and became a majority in 2005 for the first time since 1987 when we began collecting data on enrollment by age.

They retained that majority in 2006, but the expected peak in 2008 of Connecticut public high-school graduates may in the next decade reverse this 13-year pattern of growth in traditional undergraduates.

Public institutions enrolled 63 percent of all students in 2006, and the independent institutions captured the other 37 percent. The 12 community colleges are the largest sector of higher education in Connecticut, enrolling 26 percent of all students, and the 19 regional independent colleges, with 24 percent, are the second largest sector. These two sectors combined enroll a slight majority (50.7%) of college students in Connecticut.

Total fall 2006 enrollments are 81 percent undergraduates, 18 percent graduate students and two percent first-professional students – i.e., medical doctors (broadly defined), lawyers and clergy. An overwhelming majority of both first-professional students (88%) and undergraduates (68%) are enrolled full-time and almost a majority of graduate students (48%) attend full-time.

## **FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT (FTE) ENROLLMENT**

FTE enrollments are more standardized and comparable across institutions and serve as a better measure of resources needed for instruction and academic support. FTE uses the total credit-hour load taken by the total headcount enrollment and calculates what the completely hypothetical headcount would be if that total credit load was instead taken by students who are

all attending full-time. Table 2 displays both headcount and FTE data by level for every institution, along with the percent change for each total since last year.

The statewide headcount enrollment of 176,542<sup>3</sup> translates into 136,240 FTE enrollment, meaning that the “average” student is just over three-fourths full-time (77%). The 12 community colleges, whose headcount of 46,489 (26% of the state total) makes them the largest of the six major sectors, falls to third place in their FTE enrollment of 26,049 — 19 percent of the state total, behind the shares of FTE of 26 percent for the regional independents and 20 percent for the Connecticut State University (CSU).

The 2006 increase of 2.9 percent in FTE enrollment, compared to a 1.3 percent rise in headcount enrollment, indicates that average credit loads are growing. That is no surprise given the 2006 increases of 1.9 percent in full-time headcount and 0.2 percent in part-time headcount.

The average FTE per headcount student by major sector this year are:

- 106 percent at the national independents — i.e., virtually all full-time, with some taking more than a full load
- 85 percent at UConn
- 82 percent at the regional independents
- 77 percent at CSU
- 56 percent at the community colleges

Table 3 (headcount) and Table 4 (FTE) present 15 years of comparative enrollment data.

## DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE

**RESIDENCE.** Total headcount enrollment in fall 2006 consists of 73 percent Connecticut residents, 23 percent out-of-state students and four percent non-resident aliens. (Non-resident aliens are non-citizens who are in the U.S. on student visas, regardless of their residence while attending college.)

The number of in-state students rose in each of the last eight years, and in 2006 surpassed the in-state numbers from two decades ago in 1986. In-state enrollment, however, generally increased at a slower rate than overall enrollment to yield a decline in the in-state share. Out-of-state students, both in numbers and as a share of the total, rose in each of the last 10 years.

A surprise this year is an increase of nine percent in non-resident alien students after three years of decline and a cumulative 12 percent drop between 2002 and 2005. One hypothesis for the surprise is logistical improvements in the system that U.S. Immigration and Customs

Enforcement uses to register and track foreign students. National data to be released later will let us determine whether this is a national phenomenon or limited to Connecticut.

Table 5 provides a complete breakdown of residence by level and sector during the last six years. At the undergraduate level in recent years, the in-state share of students ranges from virtually all (i.e., 97%-98%) at the community colleges and UConn regional campuses to less than 15 percent at the national independents (Connecticut College, Trinity, Wesleyan and Yale)

The regional independents (i.e., the four-year independent colleges, excluding Connecticut College, Trinity, Wesleyan and Yale) for the second consecutive year had state residents as a minority of their undergraduates, with in-state residents representing 48.5% of undergraduates. The share of in-state students among undergraduates in this sector first fell below 70 percent in 1988, 60 percent in 1997, and 50 percent in 2005, and in-state undergraduates at the regional independents maintained their minority status in 2006. Total undergraduate enrollment at the regional independents increased six percent between 1988 and 2006, but that modest overall increase masks in-state enrollment decreases of 26 percent and an almost doubling (up 90%) of out-of-state enrollment.

Over the last nine years at the UConn—Storrs campus, out-of-state undergraduates have more than doubled in numbers (from 1,683 in 1997 to 3,790 in 2006) and went from 15 percent to 23 percent of all undergraduates. The number of in-state undergraduates rose every year since 1995 — from 9,569 to 12,391 in 2006. The in-state share of the total, however, fell from 84 percent to 76 percent. Over the last 20 years (1986 to 2006), total undergraduate enrollment rose 25 percent, while in-state undergraduates increased by only six percent or 669 students.

**RACE/ETHNICITY.** Data on race and ethnicity among college students in Connecticut for fall 2006 appears in Tables 6 (all enrollments) and 6-A (undergraduates only). Total enrollment of minority students is more than one in five (22.0%) among all students and two percentage points higher (24.0%) among undergraduates.<sup>4</sup> Minority students also are more heavily concentrated in the public sector than in the independent sector — 24 percent and 19 percent of total enrollment. (The minority share among undergraduate in the five major sectors — sorted from high to low — are 32.5% at the community colleges, 24.1% at the national independents, 19.4% at UConn, 18.7% at the regional independents and 18.0% at CSU.)

Between 1976 and 2006, the total number of minority students more than quadrupled — from 9,314 to 38,814. The increases were more than 10-fold (i.e., up 953%) for Asian Americans, up by a factor of seven for Hispanics, close to tripling for African-Americans, and more than doubling for American Indians or Alaskan Natives. (White students increased only 2% over these three decades.) Because total enrollment saw an increase of 20 percent over this 30-year period, the increases in the share of minority enrollment (see exhibit) are only slightly less impressive.

As seen above, the overall minority share among college students in fall 2006 (22.0%) is less than the 2005 share in the general Connecticut population (23.5%) in 2005 and slightly higher than that share among the adult population (21.4%). (The minority share in the 2000 Census was 20.7% for total and 18.5% for adult population, yielding an almost three percentage point increase in minority enrollment in the last five years.)

Among the four minority groups, Hispanics or Latinos are the only group whose representation among college students still is less than their representation in the general population, under either definition. The share of African Americans among college students (9.8%) is not much higher than their share among the general population (9.2%), but significantly higher than that share in the adult population (7.9%).

Minority students are more underrepresented among degree recipients than they are among college students. In fall 2006, the minority share of enrollment was 22.0 percent, but the minority share at the end of the previous academic year (2005-06) among those receiving degrees or certificates was 17.5 percent. Based on recent history, however, new gains in minority enrollment should soon result in increased degree production.<sup>5</sup>

**FIRST-TIME FRESHMEN.** A total of 28,209 students enrolled as first-time freshmen in fall 2006, with 24,653 (87%) of them attending full-time. Freshmen came from all 50 states, D.C., Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands, Guam and foreign countries.

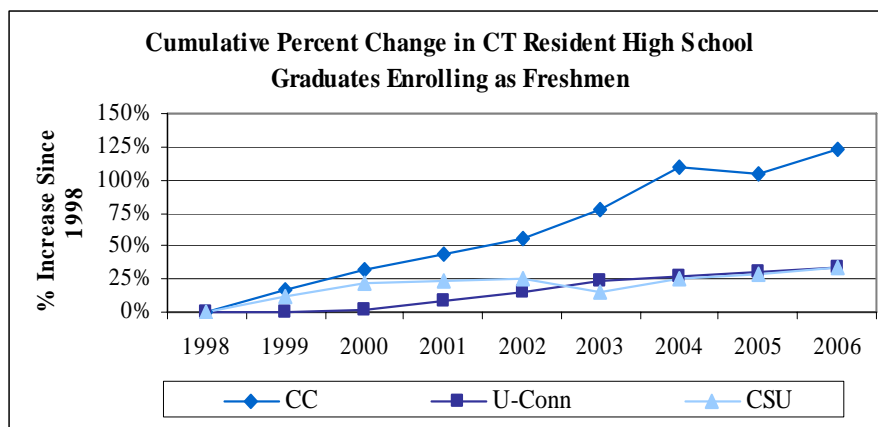
The growth in in-state first-time freshmen is slowing, perhaps as a harbinger of 2008 when Connecticut public high-school graduates are expected to peak. Between 1999 and 2004, the average annual growth in Connecticut-resident freshmen was 3.6 percent, but has slipped to 0.7 percent in the last two years.

Connecticut State University faces two challenges as it still struggles with its freshmen classes. One is a pronounced deceleration (or near disappearance) of a growth trend, from an average annual growth of 6.2 percent between 1996 and 2001 to 0.2 percent since 2001. The other challenge is enrollment instability — the annual percent changes in new freshmen between 2002 and 2006 are -2.8, -7.6, +11.2, -4.3, and +5.5 percent, respectively. That rollercoaster ride creates problems with enrollment management and course offerings that can place obstacles on the path to degrees.

More than four in five (82%) of the 2006 first-time college freshmen across the state graduated from high school within the last year (i.e., the previous June or December), two-thirds (68%) of all freshmen were from Connecticut, and a respectable majority (55%) were both recent high school graduates and from in-state. As noted, that overall pool of in-state high school graduates is expected to peak in the year 2008, and decrease nine percent over the next eight years.

In the first four years since complete reporting of this data began in 1999, the share of first-time freshmen who were both in-state and recent high school graduates ranged between 44 and 48 percent. The last four years (2003-2006) were all ones where a majority of incoming freshmen were both from in-state and recent high school graduates.

The public sector increases in in-state and recent high school graduate freshmen are far from uniform, as shown in the graph to the right. Since 1998, the community colleges more than doubled (up 123%) their numbers (2,483 to 5,539), while UConn had only a 34 percent increase (2,490 to 3,343) and CSU just a 33 percent change (3,009 to 4,001). Much of the growth at the community colleges reflects enrolling high school students soon after graduation rather than increasing their share residing in Connecticut.



**RECENT HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES.** The data on first-time freshmen focuses on the “receiving” end — i.e., of freshmen enrolling in Connecticut colleges, how many are residents? This data on migration of recent high school graduates instead looks at the “sending” end — i.e., of Connecticut high school graduates going directly to college, where in the U.S. do they enroll? That data yields two sets of numbers — an indicator of likely short-term enrollment trends and statewide data on in-state retention.

The latest year of complete data on interstate migration of recent high school graduates is 2004.<sup>6</sup> In fall of that year, some 25,182 Connecticut residents graduating in the high school class of 2004 enrolled as first-time freshmen in the U.S. — 14,516 enrolled in a Connecticut college (58%)<sup>7</sup> and the other 10,666 matriculated elsewhere (42%).

Connecticut has retained an increasingly larger majority of its college-bound high school graduates from 2000 onward after retaining less than half during the 1990s. These gains occurred despite movement in the opposite direction in the regional independent sector, where the share of its recent high school graduate freshmen who were Connecticut residents was 45 percent in 1992 and 32 percent in 2004.

**GENDER.** There are two favorable (albeit relatively minor) developments in the new data on the otherwise disturbing picture of the increasing gender gap in higher education enrollment in Connecticut. First, the gender parity among first-professional students that we first reached in 2005 continued this year with females at 50.6 percent in 2006, and up from 30 percent in 1978 — where parity was reached for undergraduate and graduate students.

Second, for only the fourth time in our 25 years of annual enrollment data, the share of female students declined, from 58.4 percent in 2005 to 58.1 percent in 2006. (That drop of 0.3 percentage points compares to earlier decreases of 0.9 percentage points in 1991 — to 55.6% from 56.5% in 1990 — and decreases of less than 0.1 percentage point in both 1996 and 1997.) The 102,521 headcount of female students in fall 2006, however, is an all-time record and the third consecutive year of more than 100,000 women. (Gender data appear in Tables 9 and 10.)

There are few or no indications that this is a turning point in the gender gap which would suggest future narrowing. Even if this one-year “trend” continued at the same rate, the gender parity in enrollment would not be restored until 2029 or 23 years from now. The latest degrees conferred data (60.3% female in 2005-06, vs. 59.5% female in 2004-05) show an opposite trend of more females and a widening of the gender gap.

The gender ratio in higher education differs significantly from that in the general population of older teenagers and adults. The 15-34 age group provides an overwhelming majority (85%) of all college students in Connecticut in 2006, and yet that age group in the general Connecticut population (2005 Census estimates) had fewer females (49.2%) than males. (The female share among those 15 to 34 fell from 49.9% in the 2000 Census to 49.2% in the 2005 estimates.)

The overall 58.1 percent female among in-state college students seems especially remarkable. Even among those age 60 or older (with that age cohort providing just 0.99% of collegiate enrollment), the female share in the general population (57.6%) is less than the female share among all college students. If we allowed only state residents age 60 or over to enroll in college and selected those students at random, we would have a more gender-balanced enrollment than we currently have from the self-selections of much younger people.

The changes in the overall gender mix of our state's college students over the last 30 years are summarized to the left. The gender shares in the general population age 15-59 have remained both very stable and

virtually a 50-50 split over those three decades. Yet, one gender grew in college enrollment by 45 percent while the other gender fell in its college enrollment by two percent. The female share of college students increased by almost 10 percentage points (48.2% to 51.1%) over these three decades. This gender imbalance also appears in national enrollment data, although it is slightly more pronounced here.)

**AGE.** Connecticut undergraduates in 2006 tend to be younger than their counterparts from previous years (Tables 10A & 11), with the median age for all students at 21 years. The median ages from low to high are 20 for full-time undergraduates, 26 for full-time graduate/first-professional students, 28 for part-time undergraduates and 32 for part-time graduate/first-professional students.

The percent of undergraduates age 25 or older peaked at 37 percent in 1994 and declined each year since to reach 24 percent in 2006. The share of undergraduates age 25 or older in 2006 differs greatly by sector, ranging from 56.5 percent at the two-year independents (the smallest of the six sectors) to two percent at the national independents. Even at the community colleges, barely two-fifths (43.2%) of students are 25 or older.

Despite their decline in overall share, students age 25 or older are an important segment in higher education in Connecticut. They represent 34 percent of all in-state enrollment in Connecticut — i.e., 24 percent of undergraduate and 75 percent of combined graduate and first-professional students. Moreover, with the number of public high school graduates expected to peak in 2008 and decline thereafter, those 25 or over could return to being more than a quarter of the total enrollment.

The new U.S. Census Bureaus estimates of 2005 Connecticut population by age allows us to revisit the question of college attendance rates. Our total 2006 enrollment of 176,542 (age data is missing for only 0.16% of them) represent 6.2 percent of the state's population age 15 or older of 2,827,299. (Total state population, including those 14 or younger, is 3.51 million.)

We can also estimate the attendance rate by age group, subject to that small amount of missing age data on students. The attendance rates (total enrollment from an age group divided by the state's total population in that age group) shown on the following page.

\*The 3.1 percent attendance rate reflects 4,679 students under age 18 in 2006 out of 152,008 state residents in that age bracket as of 7/1/2005. (We do not break out the “under 18” age category in enrollment reporting, but assume that students 14 or younger are either non-existent or so rare as to not affect the data.)

## SUMMARY

The major **positive** findings from the fall 2006 enrollment data are:

- Fifth consecutive record year for **total headcount** and ninth consecutive year of growth.
- Eighth consecutive record year for **full-time headcount** and 11th consecutive year of growth in full-time enrollment.
- Seventh consecutive record year of **full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment** and ninth consecutive year of growth in FTE.
- Increases in both numbers and percentages of minority enrollments, with African Americans, Hispanics/Latinos and Asian Americans all seeing gains in both.
- A record 55 percent of first-time freshmen were both recent high school graduates and Connecticut residents.

Enrollment areas of some **concern** are:

- All but one of those five growth indicators are showing clear sign of deceleration — the growth is continuing, but the increases are tepid and (other thing being equal) we will likely see enrollment decreases at the start of the next decade. (The single exception to that obvious deceleration is for minority enrollments.)
- Especially pronounced deceleration of growth in first-time freshmen — from a 3.6 percent average annual growth between 1999 and 2004 and 0.7 percent growth in the last two years.
- Despite a slight downtick this year, a continuing gender imbalance that is approaching three female students for every two male students.
- Despite a large increase this year in enrollment of non-resident aliens, their ranks are still below their 2002 levels for a third straight year.

The developments that present **mixed implications** include:

- Increasing share of full-time enrollment.
- Growth among traditional students.
- Growth among younger students.

The positive implications of these trends are efficiency and increased likelihood of timely degree completion. The negative implications mostly reflect concerns about access to higher

education — an overemphasis on full-time and/or “day” students should not preclude those who attend part-time or on nights/weekends.

The negative implications also relate to the number of new public high school graduates in Connecticut because they are projected to peak in 2008. As the number of high school graduates levels off in the coming years, Connecticut colleges will need to develop new strategies just to maintain enrollments, let alone increase them. The future looks somewhat bleak, and Connecticut colleges and universities will continue to thrive only if they adapt to changing demographic and social circumstances.

Connecticut breached a symbolic demographic barrier in 2006 — undergraduates age 25 or older are now less than one-quarter of total undergraduate enrollment. Another demographic barrier was breached last year and continued this year, with 2006 being the second year where full-time undergraduates under age 25 were a majority of total college enrollment — i.e., including all undergraduates who are either part-time OR over 25, and all graduate and first-professional students, regardless of their attendance status or age. This is the fourth consecutive year where more than one-half of matriculating freshmen in the state are both Connecticut residents AND graduating from high school in the last 12 months. All three indicators are likely to reverse in the next three to eight years.

Only if college and universities compensate for that reduced demand will the future be good. The NCES in August 1999 first forecasted that our state’s public high school graduates would peak in 2008 (albeit while forecasting only until 2009), and makes the same “peak in 2008” forecast 7½ years later, with the post-2008 decline now projected eight year out to 2016. That pool (which is the most productive pool for freshmen) is projected to drop 9.4 percent between the 2008 peak and 2016, which is the last year of published forecasts. Connecticut needs to be ready to compensate for this expected loss.

## ENDNOTES

1. The University of Connecticut, with its main campus in Storrs, counts as one institution, but includes the UConn Health Center (its stand-alone medical and dental school in Farmington) and the three full UConn branch campuses in Avery Point, Stamford and Tri-Campus. (Tri-Campus is further broken down into its campuses in Hartford, Torrington and Waterbury.)

Not included in the statewide totals is Charter Oak State College, the state's external degree program, which enrolled 1,711 part-time undergraduates in fall 2006. The time-series data throughout this report consistently excludes Charter Oak. Many Charter Oak students are simultaneously enrolled elsewhere in Connecticut and already are in the statewide total and would be double counted if the Charter Oak totals were included in the statewide tallies. However, we are working with Charter Oak on how best to incorporate their non-double-counted students into that total.

3. This report excludes the 18 students enrolled at St. Thomas Seminary, for which FTE and demographic details are not available. With those 18 part-time graduate students excluded, the statewide total in all subsequent tables on FTE and demographic is 176,542 rather than the 176,560 total already introduced as the "raw" headcount enrollment.
4. This data understates minority enrollment because 4.0 percent of all students in fall 2006 are non-resident aliens here on student visas (and could be of any race) and 8.2 percent were reported as race/ethnicity unknown by the college. Unless all 12.2 percent with unknown race are White non-Hispanic (which is very unlikely, if for no other reason that international students from Latin America or the Iberian peninsula are overwhelmingly Hispanic), the minority share would be higher.

Alternately, the 22.0 percent minority share based on **all** students represents 25.0 percent among those with known race/ethnicity — i.e., excluding the 12.2 percent who are unknown. Mathematically, the "real" minority share of enrollments could range from 22.0 percent (if, as is very unlikely, all unknowns are White, non Hispanic) to 34.2 percent (if, as is preposterously unlikely, all unknowns are in the four racial/ethnic minorities.) Those possible lower and upper bounds of 22.0-34.2 are unrealistic and, in the absence of data on the unknowns, the 25.0 percent share would be accurate if the racial/ethnic distribution among the unknown matches the distribution among the known. In the absence of other data, that might be the most reasonable assumption.

Although we get timely data on the residence of first-time freshmen entering Connecticut colleges every year, the national data (from which we get Connecticut residents who enroll in other states) is only collected for the fall semester of even-numbered years. The data for 2006 will be reported in late April 2007 and preliminary data will probably become available this summer.

Our data are slightly different from U.S. Department of Education publications from the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES). The NCES data excludes non-Title IV colleges (those without direct Federal-funded financial aid), because those institutions are

not legally required to report to the Integrated Post-Secondary Education Data System (IPEDS).

However, we require IPEDS colleges in Connecticut (even if not Title IV) to report that enrollment data to us, and thus count as retained in-state the nine CT resident high school graduates who enrolled as freshmen at the U.S. Coast Guard Academy in 2004. More important, we count the 219 high school graduate residents of other states in 2004 who also enrolled as freshmen at U.S.C.G.A. in another migration statistic — i.e., “imported” students in the net migration calculation of exported minus imported.

What differs is the denominator or base of those two fractions. The base for the 58 percent in-state retention rate is the 25,182 Connecticut resident and recent high school graduates who matriculated at colleges anywhere in the U.S. The base for the 52 percent rate for Connecticut resident recent high school graduates is the 27,814 total first-time freshmen matriculating at Connecticut colleges. The two statistics give distinct (albeit similar) readings on the condition of higher education in Connecticut.
